Two notable galleries are “Examining the Holocaust” and “Breaking the Silence” (covers the Ukrainian Holodomor and various genocides).

[The Manitoba Museum](#) is the province’s largest, not-for-profit heritage and science centre. It features a life-size Ukrainian rye farm diorama and other cultural gems throughout. It is renowned for a vivid portrayal of Manitoba’s rich and colourful history, Planetarium shows, and Science Gallery exhibits. The Museum’s collections reflect the rich heritage of Manitoba’s people. Travel through millions of years as you journey from north to south across Manitoba’s vast and varied landscape, from the icy arctic coast to the windswept prairies.

[Mennonite Heritage Village](#) is a turn-of-the-century Russian Mennonite village where you can taste traditional Mennonite fare, explore a classic Mennonite house barn and a fully operational Dutch windmill, and view historic heirloom treasures from Poland and Russia to Canada. The village is a 45-minute drive from downtown Winnipeg to Steinbach, Manitoba. Pioneer Days is on from July 31 to August 3.
